UNB is facing a significant shortfall with respect to library acquisitions funding, in significant measure due to the weak Canadian dollar. Please see our FAQ at http://www.lib.unb.ca/collections/costFAQ.php for more information on the situation.

As most of our money pays for ongoing subscriptions – to databases, journal packages and individual journal titles, reference resources, streaming video and so on – we must consider which of these resources can be cut while inflicting the least possible damage to research and teaching. Several measures are used to evaluate our subscriptions prior to renewal, including but not limited to, cost inflation, usage statistics, current and ongoing course offerings, faculty research, and so on. We also take into consideration information gleaned from faculty, either directly or through their departmental library representatives, to anticipate ongoing requirements.

Since cuts to library resources are unavoidable in the current economic climate, and because any cuts we make will affect research and teaching, we are actively seeking input, from faculty and graduate students in particular, to help inform our decisions. We are hoping for feedback from across the university and we therefore encourage you to take a few minutes to complete this survey.

The deadline for response is April 1, 2016. Once the survey is closed, we will compile the responses and share them with the community. The plan is to come up with an expenditure reduction strategy by April 30, in time for the new fiscal year and the renewal season that begins in May.
